

18th ANNUAL HIGH SCHOOL ENTREPRENEURS' BUSINESS PLAN COMPETITION

Middle and high school teens from across California, as well as schools from New Mexico, New Jersey, Florida and Texas, displayed their entrepreneurial expertise at the 18th Annual High School Entrepreneurs' Business Plan Competition on Sunday, May 22, 2022, on Zoom. Vying for cash prizes to fund their business concepts or build college savings, 48 business teams, composed of nearly 200 teens, competed in three categories of competition: products, services and social enterprise. Almost \$10,000 was awarded to 13 business teams, with the overall winner, a team of two young women competing in the social enterprise category, walking away with a \$2,000 award. An impressive group of successful entrepreneurs, venture capitalists, corporate officers and other business professionals from around the nation and from Australia served as volunteer judges.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS CROSSED STATE LINES!



LOS ANGELES UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

More that 450 rising 6th and 9th grade students within Los Angeles Unified School District's Linked Learning initiative were provided an innovative summer program focused on team work. Since each Linked Learning school had a

different industry focus, Project ECHO catered the curriculum to fit their needs by incorporating case studies and design challenges relevant to each school's industry. Teams presented their business ideas to volunteer judges, answered their questions, and winning teams walked away with medal lanyards and major bragging rights!



JP MORGAN CHASE'S THE FELLOWSHIP INITIATIVE

In partnership with JP Morgan Chase's The Fellowship Initiative (TFI), 162 young men of color from Houston, Los

Angeles, Oakland, and Chicago, got to participate and compete in an entrepreneurship start-up program. 28 teams presented their problem statements, solutions, marketing plans, financial analysis and prototypes, with winning teams awarded college scholarships. By introducing entrepreneurship into under served communities that haven't had this opportunity, Project ECHO supported TFI's ongoing efforts to provide participating teens with education, skills and resources that ultimately contribute to greater economic mobility.



AFTER-SCHOOL ALL-STARS

Project ECHO's entrepreneurship teacher, Marsha Thompson, was Zoomed in to 15 different Los Angeles After-School All-Stars classrooms reaching 285 middle school students. Inside each classroom, ASAS teachers

worked alongside teams of students as they created a product or service that would solve a community problem. The program culminated with a virtual event where students presented their start-ups to a panel of judges. Winning teams were mailed their medals and every student received a Certificate of Accomplishment. This program was funded by the California Community Foundation.



FOX FAMILY FOUNDATION

In partnership with Fox Family Foundation, Project ECHO launched the InVisions Entrepreneurship Contest, designed to empower higher level thinking. The overarching theme is to challenge students of all ages to build a more inclusive

society for those with disabilities through entrepreneurship and innovation. Together, Project ECHO and the Fox Family Foundation hosted a two-week virtual program in which students created a product or service for the blind and visually impaired community. The capstone event allowed participants to present their solutions during a virtual contest.
